

Visit the **Places** That Shaped Dublin

The people of Dublin are fiercely proud of their city's rich history. Dublin was established more than 1,000 years ago on the east coast of Ireland, and many of the places that helped define the traditions, customs and identity of Ireland's capital still stand today.

You can't miss Dublin Castle, which towers over central Dublin. The castle was built in 1230 as a defensive fortification in a land then ruled by the Normans. The

castle has been a major political focal point as well, serving as the seat in the British government's administration of Ireland until 1922, and since 1938 it's taken the dual role of an Irish government complex and conference center.

The *cathedral* was founded in 1191 and is aptly named after Ireland's patron saint. Today, the cathedral hosts various national ceremonies, including Ireland's

Remembrance Day ceremony to honor the ending of the Irish War of Independence and daily performances of its famed choir.

Queen Elizabeth I founded *Trinity* College, Ireland's oldest university and one of the seven ancient universities of Britain and Ireland, in 1592. The university

is noted for educating a litany of poets, playwrights and authors, and is the home of the Book of Kells, an illuminated religious manuscript from the medieval period.

The backbone of Dublin are its more than 700 pubs, where people from all walks of life come together to talk about life and raise a glass to the day's achievements, big or small.

Each pub has a unique atmosphere that embodies its surrounding neighborhood. Some pubs have the cozy feel of a library where you'll find patrons buried deep in a book. Some are known for live music where locals have belted out "The Wild Rover," Ireland's most popular pub song, countless times. And some are traditional watering holes without the frills.

From The Brazen Head, Dublin's oldest pub dating back to 1198, to the lively Temple Bar with its nonstop live Irish music, there's a seat in Ireland's most-visited establishments waiting for you at Mutual Sales Leaders 2025.

Colcannon, which is made using mashed potatoes with cabbage or kale


Soda bread, made with only the most basic ingredients to create the perfect consistency of being dense, yet soft


Then wash it down with a pint of *Guinness* or an *Irish coffee*.
